An overview of the rules to jog your memory





Form

How do we form the first conditional?

subordinate clause

if/unless + present form

OR

have + past participle

+ main clause

will (or other modal auxiliary) + infinitive

OR

🙀 imperative

If anything goes wrong, I'll contact your agent.

subordinate clause

→ if + present form

main clause

will + infinitive

Unless there is a traffic jam, we will be on time for the premiere.

subordinate clause

 \longrightarrow

Unless + present form

main clause

 \rightarrow

will + infinitive

If you have left the dressing room open, we may find a fan inside

subordinate clause

 \rightarrow

have + past participle

main clause

 \rightarrow

modal auxiliary + infinitive

Don't ring me up, unless the script changes.

main clause

 \rightarrow

imperative

subordinate clause

 \longrightarrow

unless + present form

III Caution: main and subordinate clauses can change order in a sentence!



Meaning

When do we use the first conditional?

To express a real possibility/likeliness in the present or future.

If you keep acting like that towards your fans, he will fire you.

→ It is possible that the person will be fired soon if they keep acting that way towards their fans.
