HOW DO WE FORM THE THIRD CONDITIONAL?

subordinate clause + **main clause**

if/unless + had + past participle

Would, could, might + have + past participle



EXAMPLE 1


If anything had gone wrong, I would have contacted you.

subordinate clause

=> If + had + past participle

main clause

=> would + have + past participle



EXAMPLE 2


If I had been at home yesterday, the fire might never have started.

subordinate clause

=> If + had + past participle

main clause

=> might + have + past participle



MEANING



WHEN DO WE USE THE THIRD CONDITIONAL?

To express that something might have happened in the past, but didn't happen.

Example: We might have believed her, if she hadn't lied so often before.



WHEN DO WE USE THE THIRD CONDITIONAL?

To express that something was impossible and therefore didn't happen.

Example: If I had been you, I would have been more careful.
