





#### Zero conditional sentences

→ tenses in both parts of the sentence = present simple

If clause (condition)	Main clause (result)
If + simple present	simple present
If this thing happens	that thing happens

Order of the clause is NOT fixed → may need to

\* rearrange pronouns

\* adjust punctuation

→ meaning = identical

'If' can be replaced by 'when'  $\rightarrow$  meaning = identical

### EXAMPLES

- If you heat ice, it melts
- Ice melts if you heat it.
- When you heat ice, it melts.
- Ice melts when you heat it.





## USE 1

Zero conditional sentences

- statements about the real world
- General truths (e.g., scientific facts)

Time = now or always
Situation = real and possible

### EXAMPLES

- If you freeze water, it becomes solid.
- Plants die if they don't get enough water.
- If my husband has a cold, I usually catch it.
- If public transport is efficient, people stop using their cars.



# USE 2

Giving instructions  $\rightarrow$  main clause = imperative

#### EXAMPLES

- If Bill phones, tell him to meet me at the cinema.
- Ask Pete if you're not sure what to do.
- If you want to come, call me before 5.00.
- Meet me here if we get separated.
